Partial Calendars of Concerts given by the *Kapelle des III Seebataillons, 1905–1914;* *Tsingtau Orchestra/Band, 1915–1919*

The first section is a partial list of the ‘symphonic’ concerts given by the Tsingtau Orchestra prepared chiefly from the reviews and reports published in *Die Musik* (as listed in Appendix I), but with additional material (adverts, reports and reviews) in [online digitised copies](#) of the *Tsingtauer Neueste Nachrichten* for the period 11 March–30 June 1914, from Megumi Shimura, *Musikleben im deutschen Pachtgebiet Tsingtau 1897–1914*,¹ from reviews of its Shanghai concerts that appeared in *The North China Herald* in the years 1904–14² and from the handbills included in various fascicles of the *Konzert-Programm-Austausch* (Leipzig: Breitkopf & Härtel, 1893–1941).³ It should be remembered that the ensemble was also extremely busy providing numerous concerts that provided entertainment music (with some classical favourites mixed in) in a variety of venues and social events, and also participated in the routine military events that required a musical contribution.

In the [first report of 1911](#), Georg Crusen for the most part merely lists the composers heard in the final concerts of the 1909–10 season (Gade, Svendson, Hartmann, Sibelius, Grieg and Wagner (a whole concert), and adopts the same approach in his passing reference to the opening concert (11 September) of the 1910–11 season (Weber, Wagner, Saint-Saëns, Grieg, Humperdinck, Liszt). He comments that this second concert was rather lighter than usual, perhaps in acknowledgement of the taste of summer tourists. Another factor may have been that at some point that year, Wille left for leave in Europe, and did not return until the autumn.

Little information about the orchestra’s tours (e.g. to Peking, Tientsin, and Tschifu) has been traced to date, but the visits to Shanghai are well documented in the reports and reviews that appeared in the *North China Herald* (*NCH*).

The reports and reviews consulted often fail to give the precise date of an event, so where possible conjectural date ranges are provided, usually taking the date of the publication of the report as a *terminus ante quem*. These sources also often offer imprecise or partial information about the content of programmes. Normally only concerts that can be dated or for which the programme can be established or reconstructed with some degree of probability are included below; the ordering of programme items is often conjectural.

Performers in green were (or probably were) local amateurs.
